Development of Evaluation Tools

- The effectiveness of education seminars for the general public
 - Before and after questionnaires responded to by audience raising hands
 - Rated by representatives of 3 Centers and Alz. Assn.
 - Established inter-rater reliability of independent raters
 - Provided evidence for the effectiveness of our outreach programs
 - Seminar series at NYUMC
 - Outreach in community settings



Development of Evaluation Tools

- The effectiveness of CME courses for physicians in the community
 - Used audience response system
 - Assessed change in willingness to refer patients and family members for evaluation, participation in clinical trials and services of the Alzheimer's Assn.



Annual Mayor's Conference on Alzheimer's Disease

- Increase visibility to many service providers who attend
- One table for NYCARE rather than 3 tables for 3 centers
 - Shares cost
 - Advertises collaboration



Our New Partner New York City Department for the Aging (Our local Area Agency on Aging)

- Builds on 20+ year informal relationship
- Facilitates sharing resource information
- Potential for new funding opportunities
- Broader base for potential client contact
 - Caregiver programs National Family Caregiver Support Program
 - 15 Community Partners
 - serving people who speak 13 languages (besides English)
 - Case management.
- Experience providing services to the underserved
- Experience negotiating the system
- Experience with non-English speaking elderly
- Familiarity with issues unique to different areas and cultures
- Linkage to groups advocating for benefits for the elderly with dementia and their families.



Challenges to Collaboration
