Featured Network Member

Peggye Dilworth-Anderson is Professor of Health Policy and Management, Gillings School of Global Public Health and Associate Director of Aging & Diversity/Institute on Aging (IOA) at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Her areas of expertise include minority aging and health, family caregiving, and health disparities. Her current research focuses on health disparities pertaining to Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. Her research has been funded by the National Institute on Aging, Administration on Aging, GlaxoSmithKline Community Partnership Program, National Alzheimer's Association, and the March of Dimes. In addition to her research being published and cited in professional journals, her work is also cited in the print media such as the New York Times, USA Today, and local newspapers. Dr. Dilworth-Anderson serves in a number of leadership roles in the field of aging. She is President-elect of the Gerontological Society of America, a member of the National Institute on Aging (NIA) Advisory Council (2007-2010), a member of the board of directors of the National Alzheimer's Association, and on the editorial board of three professional journals that address aging issues. Dr. Dilworth-Anderson completed her undergraduate training in sociology from Tuskegee Institute, and received her master's and doctorate degrees in sociology from Northwestern University in 1972 and 1975, respectively. She received post-doctoral training from the Midwest Council on Social Research in aging research with additional training at Harvard Geriatric Education Center. She is a Fellow of the Gerontological Society and the National Council of Family Relations. Her current professional affiliations include the Gerontological Society of America, National Council on Family Relations, American Sociological Association, and the American Public Health Association.

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Overview

The [NIH Public Access Policy](#) ensures that the public has access to the published results of NIH funded research. It requires scientists to submit final peer-reviewed journal manuscripts that arise from NIH funds to the digital archive [PubMed Central](#) upon acceptance for publication. To help advance science and improve human health, the Policy requires that these [papers](#) are accessible to the public on PubMed Central no later than 12 months after publication.

How to Comply

1. [Address Copyright](#): Ensure your publishing agreement allows the paper to be posted to PubMed Central in accordance with the NIH Public Access Policy.
2. [Submit Papers](#): Submit papers to PubMed Central
3. [Cite Papers](#): Include the PMCID at the end of the full citation

To what [papers](#) does the NIH Public Access Policy apply?

How to Comply

1. Address Copyright

Before you sign a publication agreement or similar copyright transfer agreement, make sure that the agreement allows the paper to be posted to PubMed Central (PMC) in accordance with the [NIH Public Access Policy](#). Final, peer-reviewed manuscripts must be posted to the NIHMS upon acceptance for publication, and be made publicly available on PMC no later than 12 months after the official date of publication. See "[Whose approval do I need to submit my final peer-reviewed manuscript to PubMed Central](#)" for more information.

Points to consider.

- Which [submission method](#) will be used?
- What [version](#) of the paper will be made available on PMC?
- Who will submit the paper?
- When will it be submitted?
- Who will approve the submission?
- When will the paper be made public on PMC?

2. Submit Papers

Authors may submit a paper to the journal of their choice for publication. There are four methods to ensure that a manuscript is posted to PubMed Central in compliance with the NIH Public Access Policy.

Quick Facts

[Peer-reviewed journal manuscripts](#) arising from NIH funds are required to be submitted to PubMed Central.

Submitting a final peer-reviewed manuscript usually takes less than 10 minutes. [Click here to Login](#).

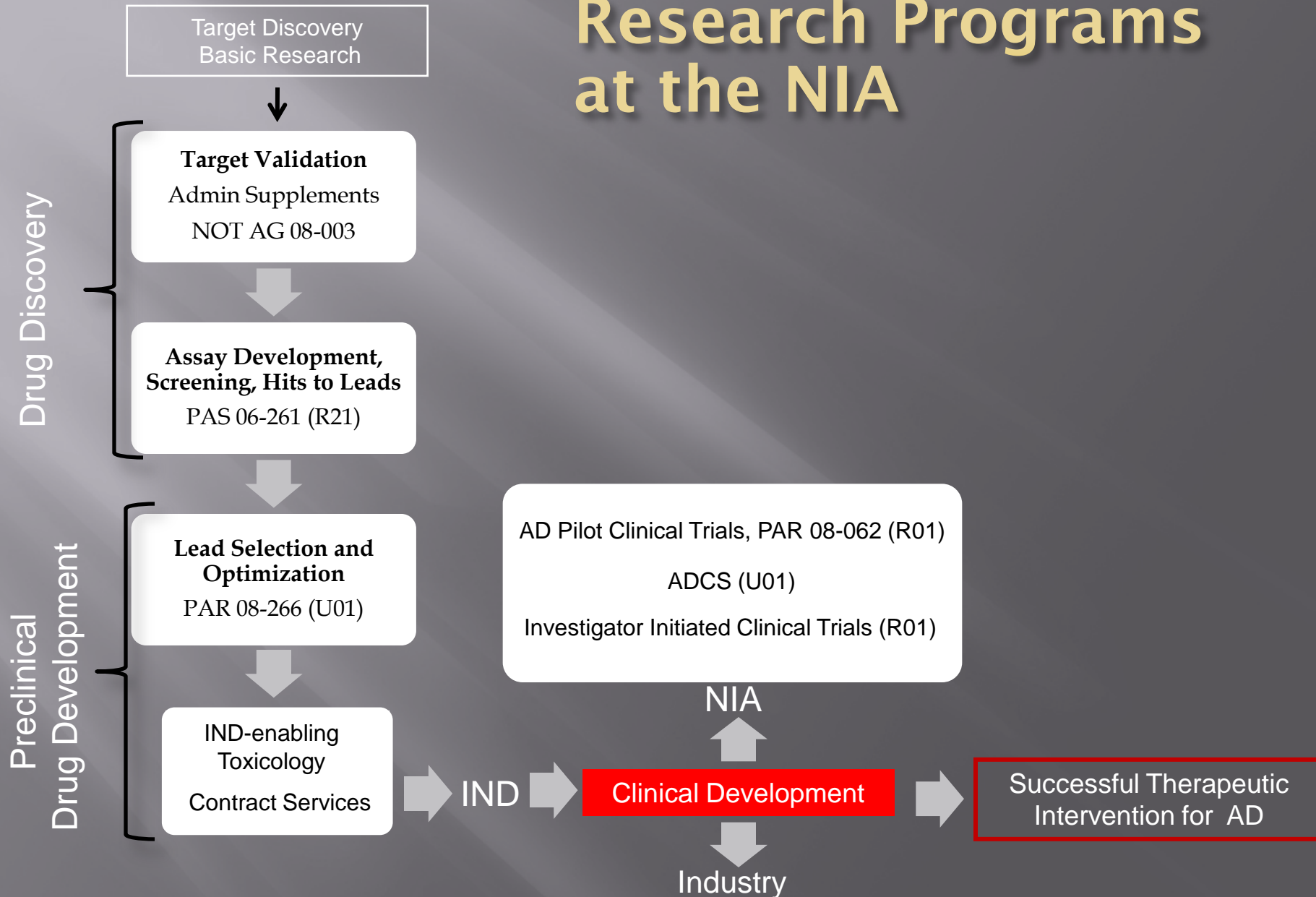
