- NO: 9 centers
- Top reasons:
 - Time
 - Lack of knowledge; didn't know it existed; dread learning something new; not essential to my productivity
 - Out of date; seems jumbled
 - Go directly to information sources rather than links; duplication on NACC website
 - My questions are center specific
 - Can never remember my login/password

Do you use the wiki? Why?

- YES: 8 centers
- Top reasons:
 - Personnel directory
 - Info on ADC meetings, past and present
 - Guidance on progress report
 - Looking for links
 - Meeting management tools
 - Information on: site visits, Directors' Dinner, acronyms

Which topics are strongest ?

- Guidance on progress report
- Helpful links, minutes of past meetings, calendar
- Archived material: RFAs, agendas, notes
- Planning Directors' Dinner
- Concentration of links from NACC, ADEAR
- References that don't change very often

Which topics are weakest?

- Hard to search
- Lack of information:
 - Help with grant applications
 - NIH notices
 - Formatting forms and tables
 - Grant submission process
- Anything that needs to be regularly updated; only links are current

How would you improve the wiki?

- Needs more consistent attention and updates
 - Needs more information
 - More tools that are easy to use
 - More information on pilots, sample pilot RFPs, filling out progress report tables
- Pick 5-10 most frequently asked questions and post them
- 3. Make updates easier
- 4. Need an admin wiki committee

Wiki training

What is a wiki?

- A simplified website that editable by members
- Designed for collaborative information sharing
- Wikipedia is the most famous wiki

How are wikis useful?

- Searchable content
- Minimal technical skills needed to create and edit pages
- Can upload files, images, video, audio, etc.
- Watchlists and email notification let you track changes
