


Kentucky Demographics

- 13% of the population are seniors (65+)
- 29% live alone
- 9% have an annual income of less than \$10k
 32% less than \$20k



Outreach & Demographics


- African Americans in KY = 7.5% of population
- Nearly 60% of AA are concentrated in Jefferson (46.1%) and Fayette Counties (12.8%)
- Jefferson County: \$15,703 AA vs. \$28,654 for White Fayette County: \$16,088 vs. \$30,377




African American Dementia Outreach Partnership Council (AADOP)







The Balm in Gilead Collaboration

2018 Memory Sunday Highlights

- 246 Congregations signed-up Online to participate reaching ~75,000 congregational members.
- The Balm In Gilead hosted 6 in-person Memory Sunday events across the country reaching over 500 participants in Atlanta, Boston, Chattanooga, Seattle, Jacksonville, and Baltimore.
- Campaign garnered approximately 650,000 media impressions across radio, print, and social media.

2018 Memory Sunday Highlights

- More than 600 downloads of Memory Sunday Toolkits and The Book of Alzheimer's.
- 95% of participating churches distributed materials.
- 43% hosted a special event or service for caregivers.
- 38% partnered with local public health or community-based agencies to table and provide information on Alzheimer's and dementia.

- 11 Lexington & 13 Louisville Churches
- 155 Memory Screens
- 73% African American
- New ADC Clinic

Note: 153 Screens in 2016 31% African American

2018 so far

- 27 Lexington & 14 Louisville Churches
- 77 Memory Screens
- 67% African American
- Two ADC Clinics in Louisville
- 18% AA participants in ADC
